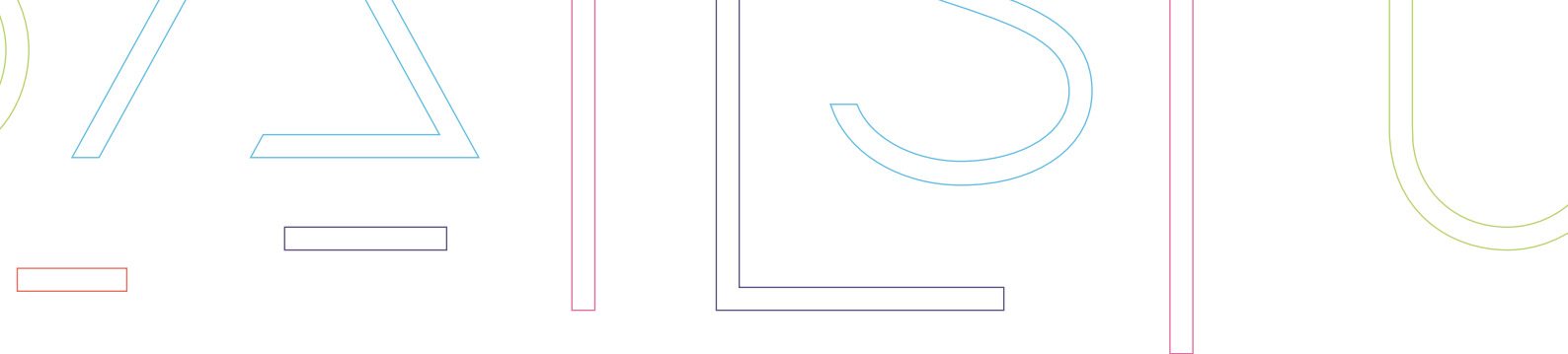

Notes for the PSI Annual Conference

Presenters

All **presenters of papers** are required to be present in the session room 10 minutes before the start of the session (where possible), and out of courtesy to fellow presenters, we ask that you attend for the full session. Early arrival is to allow time to load presentations on to audio visual devices and to confer with the Session Chair. If you are a speaker who intends to use PowerPoint in your presentation, you should note that you must load the file onto the relevant computer in the session room 10 minutes before the session begins. If you would like to use your own computer (and you are sure that no time will be lost), please inform the Conference Support Staff Member in your location.

In so far as possible, papers will be presented in the order given in the Conference programme and papers will adhere strictly to the agreed time schedule (usually twenty minutes per paper). Session Chairs will be firm, ensuring that presentations end at the agreed time. In the rare event of a presenter failing to turn up, Session Chairs will move immediately to the next listed presentation.

Presenters of posters, student and academic/ practitioner, are required to be at their poster during the poster round on Friday 13th from 18.30 – 19.45. Poster presenters are also welcome to be present at their posters during the breaks on Friday.

BRINGING THE OF RIGHTS CHILDREN CLOSER TO HOME - THE OMBUDSMAN FOR CHILDREN

Dr Niall Muldoon - Ombudsman for Children

As Ombudsman for Children, Niall often returns to the question posed by Eleanor Roosevelt in 1958: *"Where do human rights begin?"* Her answer remains compelling: *"In small places, close to home – so close and so small that they cannot be seen on any map of the world. Yet they are the world of the individual person: the neighbourhood he lives in; the school or college he attends; the factory, farm or office where he works... Unless these rights have meaning there, they have little meaning anywhere."* In a presentation to the UN Committee on the Rights of the Child in June 2015, Niall suggested the realisation of children's rights in Ireland is an unfinished project. The economic crisis that has beset Ireland for much of the past decade has had serious consequences for thousands of children. The most recent available data indicate 138,000 children are living in consistent poverty. A State that respects human rights is one that prioritises the human rights of its citizens, including children, in budgetary, legislative and administrative decision-making. Failings in this regard are evident in different areas of public administration concerning children where policy implementation has dominated over children's rights and best interests. This address will look at where progress has been made, what the challenges still are for Ireland's children and how it is essential to develop a culture of child-friendly public administration in Ireland where the rights and best interests of children are a primary consideration.



Biography

Dr Niall Muldoon is Ireland's second Ombudsman for Children. He was appointed to this position on February 17th 2015, by the Head of State, His Excellency, President Michael D. Higgins, following an open competition and interview process involving children and adults. As Ombudsman for Children, Dr Muldoon is directly accountable to the Houses of the Oireachtas.

In his previous role as Director of Investigations at the Ombudsman for Children's Office Niall oversaw the handling of almost 1600 complaints per year made by, or on behalf of, children and young people about public bodies such as the HSE, Tusla, Schools and Voluntary Hospitals. He ensured a culture of independence, impartiality and child centeredness underpinned the work at all times.

Niall is a Registered Counselling and Clinical Psychologist who has worked in the area of Child Protection for almost 20 years. Prior to joining the OCO in 2012, Niall spent five years as National Clinical Director of CARI – a Children's Charity providing therapy and support to children and families, from all over Ireland, affected by sexual abuse. He spent ten years working in the Granada Institute providing therapy, risk assessments and support to adults who had sexually offended against children and to those who had been abused as children. He was regularly called upon to provide expert testimony in the courts. Niall also worked within the field of Intellectual Disability for a number of years and indeed completed his Masters on the Development of a Relationship and Sexuality Programme for Adults with Intellectual Disability.

TOWARDS SCIENCE-BASED INTERVENTIONS IN THE FIRST YEARS OF LIFE: SUPPORTING INFANT-PARENT MENTAL HEALTH

Dr J. Kevin Nugent - Director, Brazelton Institute, Division of Developmental Medicine, Boston Children's Hospital; Lecturer, Harvard Medical School; Professor Emeritus, University of Massachusetts at Amherst.

While basic clinical issues such as self-regulation, trust, attachment, autonomy and individuation are undoubtedly life course issues, the thrust of this presentation is that these issues are being actively negotiated by infants and parents from the very beginning. Advances in neuroscience and behavioral research reveal that the brain has the most plasticity during the early years, which means that it is a period of both vulnerability and opportunity. As such, this stage – beginning before birth – presents us, as psychologists, with a unique opportunity to affect change at what can be called a critical transition stage in brain development and in the development of emotional and physical health, social skills, and cognitive-linguistic capacities that are all important for success in school, the workplace, and in the larger community. This presentation will go on to describe an example of a developmentally supportive, relationship-based, strength-based approach to intervention, designed to improve the lives of young children and their families and hopefully benefit society as a whole.



Biography

Dr J. Kevin Nugent is Founder and Director of the Brazelton Institute at Boston Children's Hospital and is on the faculty at Harvard Medical School. He is also Professor Emeritus of Child and Family Studies at the University of Massachusetts at Amherst.

Professor Nugent received his early education in Ireland and graduated summa cum laude from Boston College in the United States with a degree in Philosophy. He received his doctorate in Developmental Psychology and has worked at the Boston Children's Hospital since 1978, conducting research on newborn behavior and early parent-infant relations and training professionals in neurobehavioral assessment and intervention techniques. Dr. Nugent's areas of research include the effects of different prenatal teratogens on developmental outcome, the transition to parenthood, the role of fathers and the effects of preventive intervention on parent-child relations and developmental outcomes. He has been co-investigator with Professor Sheila Greene at Trinity College, Dublin, in a longitudinal study of child development in Ireland and has also studied child development in different cultural settings across the world. Currently, he is conducting research on the effects of the NBO as a form of preventative intervention in both hospital and Early Intervention settings, with particular emphasis on its effects on postpartum depression and on parent-child relations.

Dr Nugent is the author of many books and book chapters and over 100 scientific articles on child behavior and development and on parent-child relationships. He is co-author with Dr. Brazelton of the Neonatal Behavioral Assessment Scale (NBAS), while he and his colleagues have developed the Newborn Behavioral Observations (NBO) system, a clinical tool used in pediatric and intervention settings to sensitize parents to the competencies and individuality of their infants and to foster positive parent-child relations. Among his books are the two-volume series, *The Cultural Context of Infancy* (1989, 1991), and *The Infant and Family in the 21st Century* (2002), of which he is co-editor with Joao Gomes-Pedro, Berry Brazelton and Jerry Young. *The Newborn as a Person: enabling healthy infant development worldwide* (2009) describes newborn research and practice in settings across the globe. In 2013, he completed a textbook for college students, *Development of Children and Adolescents* with Penny Hauser-Cram, Kathleen Thies and John F. Travers and published by Wiley and Sons. In 2011, with photographer Abelardo Morell, Dr. Nugent wrote *Your Baby is speaking to You: A Visual Guide to the Amazing Behaviors of Your Newborn and Growing Baby*, a book for new parents. He is currently studying the historical context of the infant mental health movement and is editing a book on the uses of the NBO in parent-infant mental health settings around the world.

THE ROLE OF PUBLIC DISCOURSE IN SHAPING A HUMAN RIGHTS REPUBLIC

Colm O'Gorman - Executive Director of Amnesty International Ireland

In May this year, Ireland became the first country in the world to enshrine marriage equality for same sex couples in law by popular ballot. One of the most striking aspects of the referendum campaign was the quality of public debate.

It demonstrated that Irish society is more than capable of having an engaged, objective but passionate conversation on a social issue that many believed would be deeply divisive.

Colm will explore what this means for further developments in the area of human rights and equality in Ireland with a focus on the issue of sexual and reproductive rights and the role that public discourse has in realising the vision of a republic of equals enshrined in the Proclamation of Independence.



Biography

Colm O'Gorman is the founder and former Director of One in Four, the national non-governmental organisation that supports women and men who have experienced sexual violence.

In this role Colm was instrumental in the establishment of the Ferns Inquiry, the first state investigation into clerical sexual abuse. Prior to his role with One in Four Colm worked as a psychotherapist in his own practice in London.

Colm has also served as a member of the Irish Senate, having been appointed as a Senator in May 2007. He is a regular media commentator and contributor, essayist and the author of the best-selling memoir, 'Beyond Belief'.

Colm's work as a human rights defender is driven by a deep commitment to human rights and social justice and an abiding belief in the power of advocacy and activism, which challenges all of us to use our individual and collective voices to demand and work for change where it is most needed.

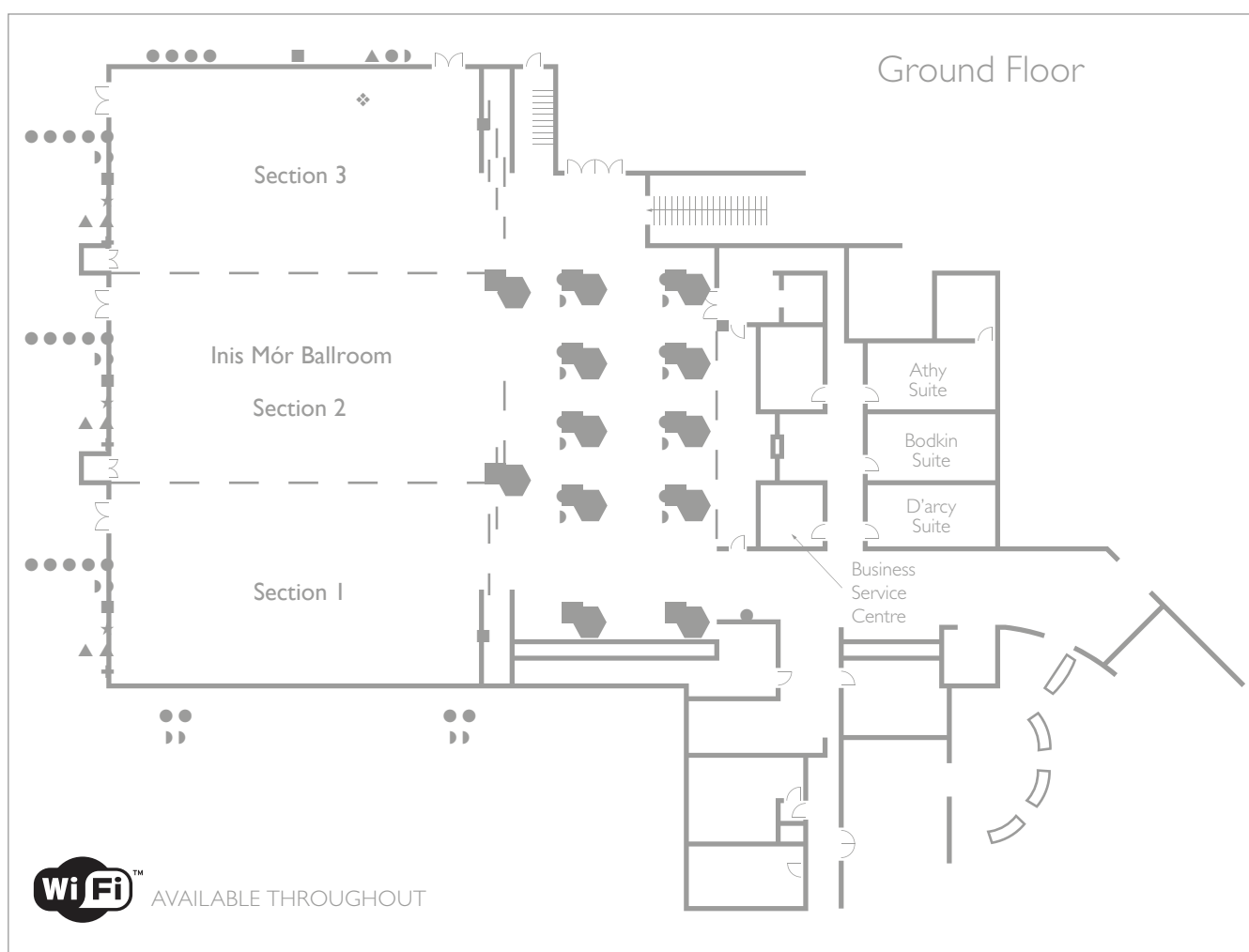

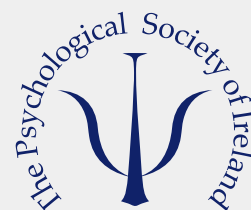
